

ROUND TRIP TO JAPAN FOR WINNERS



12 beginner speakers who are categorized as CLASS A, each made a 4 minute speech.

The audience was surprised to hear that they had an amazing ability to speak in Japanese after just a short period of study. After the speeches by participants in CLASS A, 6 participants from CLASS B made their 5-minute contributions.

Winner of CLASS A, Per Gunnar Paulsen who started studying Japanese because he became interested in Japan when he travelled in the country, talked about the Ainu which is one of minorities in Japan. He also referred to the Sami minority which lives in the Nordic countries. Winner in CLASS B was Marie Anna Midford. Her speech was about how ones own fashion works as a tool for communication. She was the youngest participant and she plans

to have a career in fashion. A flight ticket to Japan is prepared for each. These tickets are sponsored by Scandinavia-Japan Sasakawa Foundation Norway.

The 2nd winner in CLASS A was Jonas Glesaaen, who talked about the reasons why he started studying Japanese. And, that of CLASS B was Daniel Gundersen. He made a speech about Japanese food and what he thinks about it. For those who won 2nd place in each class, a Norwegian-Japanese dictionary was awarded as a prize by the Embassy.
