## Nuclear Security Summit Agrees on Measures to Prevent Nuclear Terrorism

-Japan Brief / FPCJ No.1006 April 19, 2010

The Nuclear Security Summit, which was held in Washington on the initiative of US President Barack Obama, ended on April 13 with the approval of a joint communique declaring that "Nuclear terrorism is one of the most challenging threats to international security" and vowing the establishment within the next four years of a system to secure nuclear material. The summit, which was attended by 47 states and 3 international organizations, for the first time affirmed international cooperation for the prevention of nuclear terrorism. Japan's major newspapers reported the discussions and outcome of the summit in detail.

### **Multilevel International Cooperation to Prevent Nuclear Terrorism**

President Obama, who advocated a "world without nuclear weapons" in a landmark speech in Prague in April 2009, released the Nuclear Posture Review report outlining new guidelines for US nuclear strategy on April 6 and two days later signed a new US-Russia...
