


Image 1: Letters from OURA Kanetake to KONDO Renpei, dated March 16, April 26, and April 29, 1912 (from top to bottom).

## Introduction

The National Diet Library holds 430,000 documents on modern Japanese political history, including the personal papers of politicians, high-ranking officials, and military officers. This article is one of a series introducing materials available at <a href="the Modern Japanese">the Modern Japanese</a> Political History Materials Room in the Tokyo Main Library.

These materials on modern Japanese political history primarily comprise documents that were donated by the families of prominent figures and are made available to the public after being organized and catalogued by the NDL. We hope that this article will provide readers with a glimpse into the appeal of this invaluable collection, which supports scholarly research in political history and related fields.

# **The KONDO Renpei Papers**

(1813 items, available since June 2023)

As the Industrial Revolution in Japan progressed in the aftermath of the Russo-Japanese War, there arose an industrialist class that quickly acquired political influence that could not be ignored. OURA Kanetake was a member of the Japanese police force who was generally considered to have opposed the movement for democratic rights. He also worked to organize industrialists politically so that they would support the Meiji oligarchy. He also helped to form pro-government parties such as the Daido Club and the Chuo Club. As the 11th general election for the House of Representatives on May 15, 1912, was approaching, OURA sent letters (Image 1) to the industrialist KONDO Renpei, requesting financial support for a progovernment candidate. The first letter (A) begins with a lament: "Preparations for the battle are urgently needed, and we face extreme difficulties." This was followed by a second letter (B), requesting additional funds: "We would appreciate it if you could send us more than the proposed amount." A third letter (C) closes with: "I feel as if I have 100,000 reinforcements," indicating his satisfaction with the support he had received.

In October 1912, after the election, KONDO published *Keizai shiken* (*Personal Opinion on the Economy*), which expressed concern about Japan's worsening balance of payments. KATSURA Taro shared the same concern, and when he was appointed Prime Minister for the third time in December of that year, he offered KONDO the position of Postal and Telecommunications Minister, but KONDO never actually took office.

# **OURA Kanetake (1850-1918)**

Born in Kagoshima in 1850 to a samurai family of the Miyanojo Shimazu clan. He participated in the Boshin War and after the Meiji Restoration became a member of the Tokyo Metropolitan Police Department, during which time he helped suppress the Seinan War (Satsuma Rebellion) and surveille the Freedom and People's Rights Movement. After serving as governor of Yamaguchi, Shimane, Kumamoto, and prefectures, he became Superintendent-General of the Metropolitan Police in 1898, and later became a member of the House of Peers as well as served as Postal and Telecommunications Minister, Agriculture and Commerce Minister, and Home Affairs Minister. After the Russo-Japanese War, he worked with Prime Minister KATSURA Taro and controlled the House of Peers as the leader of the Saiwai Club and also led the progovernment members of the House of Representatives, becoming an executive member of the Rikken Doshikai political party when it formed. In 1915, he lost his position due to a bribery scandal.

# KONDO Renpei (1848-1921)

Born in 1848 in Tokushima to a family of doctors. He studied at Keio Gijuku (now Keio University) and Daigaku Nanko (now the University of Tokyo) and joined Mitsubishi Shokai in 1872. In 1883, he became manager of the Yokohama branch of Yubinkisen Mitsubishi. At this time, the government and business leaders who company's considered the monopoly inappropriate established Kyodo Un'yu, resulting in fierce competition, but the two companies merged to form Nippon Yusen (NYK Line), with KONDO serving as president from 1895 until his death in 1921. After the Russo-Japanese War, he became a leader in the business world. In 1910 he was appointed head of Toshin Jitsuqyodan (Honorary Commercial Commissioners of Japan to China), in 1911 he was knighted baron, and in 1918 he was appointed to the House of Peers.

# **Fun for Children**

Children's Services Division, International Library of Children's Literature

This article is a translation of the article in Japanese in NDL Monthly Bulletin No. 759/760 (July/August, 2024).

The Children's Services Division of the International Library of Children's Literature is the only division in the National Diet Library that has a role in providing services directly to children. We read books to children and organize events. Sounds like fun, doesn't it? But children are not always so easy to deal with. They can be very tough! If they are not interested, they easily become fidgety which makes us nervous and break out in a cold sweat. It is very difficult to get children interested in things. In order to make the children have fun, we seriously consider what to deliver and how to deliver it, and we practice how to deliver reading and singing to them.

Every year, we hold a "Special event for children in Autumn" in collaboration with the Ueno Zoological Garden, which is one of the projects where we want children to have fun! It is an event which combines picture books on specific animal themes with stories by a zookeeper. One of the past themes was "Rabbits." We selected interesting picture books featuring rabbits. One is *The Amazing Tree* 

(Gochiso no ki), a delightful book written by Tanzanian picture book author John Kilaka, who illustrates the folktales of his home country in the Tingatinga¹ style. It is a story of a wise rabbit who saves animals from starvation. For the other book, we chose Nani no ashiato kana (What are these footprints?), a picture book with wonderful animal drawings by YABUCHI Masayuki, which makes us imagine the animal on the next page from the picture of the footprints. This book is a fun, quiz-style book in which the children answer questions posed by the person reading it.

The zookeeper introduced the characteristics and ecology of domestic rabbits<sup>2</sup> by giving a quiz about rabbits and showing specimens of their skulls and fur. Domestic rabbits produce two types of poop: small and round, and sticky. Sticky poop contains important nutrients so is eaten as soon as it is released, so it is rarely seen. It was full of fun to hear such unusual poop stories, but how was it for the children? The children's reactions were varied: listening to the stories, cheerfully answering the quizzes,

taking notes enthusiastically, or just being bored. Fun is a gateway to wanting to know, read and learn. If children are not interested, they will not go further on their own. Lately, we have been thinking that our job is to provide opportunities for children to pursue what they want to know on their own initiative. We are looking every day for what makes children think "This is fun!"

Research and Legislative Reference Bureau

The 13th mutual visit program with the National Assembly Library (NAL) and the National Assembly Research Service (NARS) of Korea was held online and hosted by the National Diet Library on December 18 and 19, 2024.

Ms. WANG gave an overview of the legal information services the NAL puts efforts into while showing some examples from its website, such as research on legal information as well as its portal site operation and translation of foreign materials. Also, she mentioned the AI-based platform they are currently preparing. The NDL presented an outline of information services related to the Diet including the databases related to the National Diet, laws and regulations.

After their presentations, a Q&A session was held and the participants at the seminar had an exchange regarding topics such as the operational structure at each institution.

Both Dr. CHA and Ms. MIMURA reported on the current situation and challenges of labor shortages in each country. The presentations were followed by a Q&A session and the participants exchanged ideas about the current employment situation in South Korea in the case of both young and elderly people, as well as the current situation in Japan of engaging in side jobs.


